Manuscript Word (.doc or .docx) format

8000 words, inclusive of footnotes, figure captions, references, and

glossary.

Abstract English abstract (required, max.100 words)

Non-English abstract (optional, max. 200 words)

Whenever appropriate, authors should provide an abstract in the language of the subject matter to be printed in the *Yearbook*. Use a footnote to state the romanisation systems used. Kindly inform the general editor (ytmeditor@ictmusic.org) if you use non-Latin scripts (e.g., Arabic, Chinese,

Cyrillic, Greek, Hebrew).

Author Biography Required, max. 70 words

Figures JPEG or TIFF format. In separate files.

Both greyscale and colour versions are required.

Resolution: 300 dpi at 100% size for photographs (higher

resolution may be required); 1200 dpi for maps, musical examples,

line art, complex diagrams, or other illustrations.

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Glossary As appropriate

Authors using specific and uncommon indigenous/foreign terms in the article should submit a glossary of selected terms. Please provide a separate word file with a 3-column table format listing the English romanisation, original term or characters with diacritical symbols (if any), and a brief explanation of the term.

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STYLE

Article

Font

Times New Roman, 12-point.

Margin & Indentation

Please format the text double-spaced, left-aligned paragraphs. Use margin of at least 2.5 cm.

Quotations that are five lines or longer should be put in a separate paragraph with 1.75 cm left indentation.

Italicisation

All foreign terms are italicised only at their first occurrence, except for book titles. A foreign word is one that does not appear in the *Concise Oxford English Dictionary*. For quotations, keep italicisation of the original text.

Punctuations

Quotation marks

For general quotations, article titles, emphasized terms, use double quotation marks "x." Reserve single quotation marks 'y' for quotations within quotations. Example: Sociologists Dong-Hoon Seol and John Skrentny state that in Korea "the co-ethnic newcomers are lesser members, part of a growing elaboration of what we call here 'hierarchical nationhood'" (2009:149).

Punctuations should be placed within quotation marks, as follows: "He sang the song and then stopped." "There is no need for it," she said.

Ellipses

We suggest three ways of using ellipses for your article:

"word...word" [←no space on both sides of the ellipsis]

"word. ...Beginning of the next sentence."

"word.... Next sentence."

Insert a space only after the full stop of a complete sentence. Please do not insert spaces into the ellipsis (i.e. no space between the three dots).

Dashes and Hyphen

Use hyphen - to join words or parts of words.

Use en-dash – between two dates/years, and between page numbers. Use em-dash — for parenthetical or explanatory information. In all cases, please do not use space before and after the dashes and

hyphen.

In-text Citations The *Yearbook* uses the Chicago author-date system of referencing. Intext references should appear as follows: (Koo 2014:16–17). If the author, Koo, is mentioned in the sentence, his or her name may be omitted: (2014:17).

> Within a parenthetical citation, same author/different years should be separated by commas, but different authors should be separated by semi-colons, e.g. (Pérez Fernández 2013:154–162; Koo 2014:107– 108).

For publication with an original and a revised version, please cite using the following format: (Todorov [1976]2000).

List multiple in-text citations chronologically, as in the example above.

Citing interviews and personal communications

Cite interviews, email, and personal communications using parenthetical citation.

When authors make such distinctions, "personal communication" assumes a more casual implication, such as a happenstance conversation held while walking down the street. In some cases more information will be necessary and this may be presented in a note.

In general, the order of information will be: name, format (interview/personal communication/email), date, as follows: (Joyce Mentani, pers. comm., 19 April 2004) (Geoffrey Philip Wade, email, 16 October 2004) (Pallavoor Marar, interview, 12 November 1989)

If interviews must be included in the References section (perhaps because they are referred to frequently in the article or are deposited in a public repository), please see the instructions for references below for the suggested forms.

Footnote

Use footnotes rather than endnotes. Footnote indicators come after a punctuation mark, preferably a comma or a period.^{2 (←like this)}

"Scare Quotes"

Use of "scare quotes" for English words should be avoided. If a term is particularly problematic, explain why. Some exceptions do exist, but for the most part, gratuitous quotation marks should not be used. This also applies to the use of italics added for emphasis.

Spelling

The *Yearbook* uses British English (unless you are quoting from sources that use American spelling). Whenever possible, please use the built-in "English (U.K.)" dictionaries British English in Word.

British spellings differ from American ones in a number of ways, e.g., characterisation (not characterization), travelling (not traveling), colour (not color), centre (not center), programme (not program), practise as a verb (not practice, except as a noun). Keep the spelling of an organisation's name as it is.

Figures

All illustrations, such as photographs, diagrams, maps, tables, and musical examples should be labelled "Figure" and numbered consecutively, e.g., Figure 1.

Please insert a reference to the figure in the text, and place a callout near to where the figure should appear, e.g., <**PLACE FIGURE 1 NEAR HERE**>. The general editor will consult with the typesetter to determine the final placement of figures and examples.

In a separate document, please provide complete information for the figures, including figure captions, source, photographer's name, filmed date.

References Section

The *Yearbook* uses a modified version of style based on the *Chicago Manual of Style*. The latest volume of YTM may serve as a guide. For matters of style not covered in this guide, please refer to the *Chicago Manual of Style*.
